
The provision of routine and therapeutic activities to patients who are 'ready for transfer' and are awaiting placement to a care home or complex package of care in their own home.


## Maritime

## FIVE Facts about Shipping



A Large Container Ship can store around 745 million bananas. The bananas you eat could have come from Africa or South America.

96% of all maritime security incidents globally were related to piracy and armed robbery. This threat in particular continues to be a key concern in all regions.

**Modern Pirates** favour small boats and take advantage of the small number of crew member on modern cargo vessels and transport




ships. The highest risk of piracy in the world is in the Gulf of Guinea and Nigeria; abductions, attacks and seizing of ships is common in these areas by modern pirates.

**Women** were never welcomed aboard ships historically, as it was considered bad luck! Women now serve on every type of ship, but had to wait until 2013 to serve on submarines!



**Changing Names** of ships is bad luck. Irish polar explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton's ship 'Endurance' was originally called 'Aurora'. In 1914 he set off to Antarctica and the 'Endurance' became trapped in ice. He and six men survived in a 24-foot boat and travelled 600 miles across the treacherous waters until a Chilean ship rescued them.

## **Maritime Word Search**

In 1823, cockney sailor and chancer James Porter was convicted of stealing a stack of beaver furs and transported to Van Diemen's land (the original name for Tasmania, Australia). There, he was sent to the Macquarie Harbour Island penal colony known then as 'hell on Earth'. No-one had succeeded escaping from Macquarie Island. James Porter tried twice, unsuccessfully. So, when authorities announced that the place would be closed down and prisoners transferred to the new penal station at Port Arthur, Porter saw an opportunity, and together with a few others, planned an audacious escape.

He seized control of the brig that prisoners were building to transport themselves to their new hell. The escapees sailed off into the open sea and towards Chile, a staggering 12,869 nautical miles away. They landed in Valdivia (Chile) and assumed new identities as shipwrecked sailors.

However, their new lives didn't last long; relentlessly pursued by authorities, Porter was arrested two years later, returned to England, tried and transported back to Van Diemen's Land. He was sentenced to death for piracy but the sentence was commuted and he was sent to a penal colony in Norfolk Island, which was even worse than 'hell on Earth'. Four years later, he absconded on a ship perhaps bound for New Zealand, no one is sure. Certainly, he was never heard of again.

James Porter was a typical 'Australian' larrikin whose ingenuity, gift of the gab and refusal to buckle under authority make him an irresistible anti-hero worthy of a place in Australian history.





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
